Facilities Report November 2010

Most of the Facilities work scheduled for 2010 has been completed. Steve and Corey are currently spending all their time on Haul-Out but as that starts to slow down, they will be completing some of the outstanding tasks around the club.

WHARF REPAIRS: At least two more finger piers on the South Wharf are scheduled to be completed before the winter plus some other urgently needed work on decking etc. Work is underway to investigate the remainder of the wharf work to be undertaken, to determine how best it should be done and how it can be financed. There will be more information on this at the November semi-annual AGM.



CHARLES R. BELL ROOM: Renovations to the Charles R. Bell Room are now complete (see next page) and it has been seeing plenty of use. Members will be introduced to the new-look room at a small reception following the Semi-Annual General Meeting in November.

SAFETY: As stated previously, a defibrillator has been installed in the lower level. We have now also installed three eye wash systems. One is close to the Defibrillator, one in the kitchen and one in Steve and Corey's work area.



SHOWER AREA: Hooks and benches have been installed in the shower rooms

STORAGE AREA: The last area where food and restaurant materials are stored downstairs has been cleared out, plastered and painted and new shelving installed.

TRAVEL LIFT: Maintenance work is scheduled on the engine and chains of the Travel Lift following the Haul-Out

ELECTRICAL CABINET: The electrical cabinet on the pole by Wharf 69 has been replaced with a cabinet more in-keeping with the rest of the club's buildings and cabinets

Over the Summer a great deal of clean-up work was conducted around the club by Steve, Corey and the Summer Students, and a great deal of garbage disposed of.

Once again I must give thanks to Jim, Steve and Corey for all the work they do to keep this club in tip-top condition. Members are asked to cooperate in keeping the club looking good by either dumping waste materials in the correct area in the club grounds or taking it home for disposal.

It has been a busy year with a great deal of work undertaken on the wharves and the club buildings. The completion of work on renovating the wharves will present a real challenge in the next few years.

Safety Report November 2010



I have a very nice 1 - 12 kts winds asymmetrical spinnaker with spinnaker sheets to match. It has a snuffer sock with a very nice collar (toilet seat - but not really). This is an old sail but it is in great shape - never damaged or repaired and transforms downwind to deep reach performance no end. it is easy to manage (no pole needed) and a lot of fun I have done just under 8kts with it up. Colour light green white and

blue. See the attached photo price \$600

I also have a reacher (Code sail) which has its own furler so it rolls up like another furler without a foyle. This is great for 5 - 15kts wind - colour white with red tape on the leech and luff. It is used with the same sheet as the above spinnaker. This is also in great shape. Price \$500 The two above sails would fit a boat of 25-32 ft or with at 30-36ft mast.

Also for sale a Stainless Steel force 10 BBQ with a spare new burner \$60.
