THE COMMODORE'S LETTER Barry McCallum - Commodore

Dear Member,

Back in April when I wrote to you we were "removing boat covers, painting bottoms and replacing zincs", and now after what seems like an unfairly short season, we will reverse the process and begin



putting our boats away for another long winter. As this boating season comes to a close, I would like to reflect on some of the many highlights of the Summer of 2011.

Our social calendar kicked-off in June with New Members and Flags Officers night. This year's event was well attended by ~ 95 people, 8 of whom I had the pleasure to welcome to the club as new members. George Tilley, our newest officer, received his flag and we thanked outgoing Commodore, Ken Ryan, for all his hard work last year. Sailpast was also well attended despite the blustery and cold weather. While we didn't get out on the water, I was, nonetheless, humbled by the full house and the honour of presiding over this important club tradition as this year's Commodore. The following day, the club hosted its first ever Open House, the intent of which was to increase the number of social membership. For those of you who were around on that day. I think you will agree, the club never looked better. Participants found the displays of the allied services (RCMP. Ground Search & Rescue, and Coast Guard) of particular interest, including the RNYC Sailing School and information booth. This event holds much promise for the future.

The poor weather in July did not stop our avid; some might say rabid (just kidding), racers from participating in the Wednesday night and Saturday regatta series. Five boats from the club participated in the St. John's Port Authority Race. Fiscal Restraint Not Always Easy to Take RNYC No Exception

As much as we all recognize the need to curb costs, time and time again we see that our efforts to curb costs and reduce spending are not always well received. Most members readily acknowledge that cutting costs should be the first order of business if we truly want to ensure that members are getting the "best bang for the buck" for the money they spend. It's all too easy to sporadically go to the membership and seek fee increases to cover our escalating costs, and everyone knows that costs in all sectors are continuously rising. But in 2011, we resisted the urge to raise fees until we assured ourselves that the monies we currently collect are being spent prudently, and that we have taken every step to ensure that cost cutting measures are in effect in all facets of our operation. As badly as we needed funds, and as much as we recognize that infrastructure spending cannot be delayed much longer, this was a position that was taken and supported by your executive.

There were a number of things that I really liked (and respected) about our approach to addressing our fiscal challenges this year. Firstly, I respected Commodore's McCallum insistence on insuring that <u>before we</u> go to the membership seeking yet another fee increase that we take the necessary steps to ensure that the monies that we are currently entrusted with are spent in the most prudent manner possible. We have initiated measures to carefully monitor spending and cut costs in almost all sectors of our operations.

The second thing that impressed me was Barry's strong desire to ensure that our expenditures are in keeping with the wishes and priorities of our membership. As Flag Officers and executive members we are merely there to serve. We need to ensure that our priorities are also your priorities. Very soon, the membership of the RNYC will be provided with an opportunity to present their views on various aspects of the RNYC's operations – from wharf infrastructure, to kitchen facilities, to club house amenities, to launch and haul-out practices, to boat storage, to wharf fees, and so much more to help us achieve that goal.

Fiscal Restraint Not Always Easy to Take - RNYC No Exception (Continued)

There are some glaring deficiencies in infrastructure that we must address, and these cannot be put off any longer. We are going to have to make sizeable investments to improve our wharf infrastructure, and this is undoubtedly the most costly (and necessary) investment that must be made. The truth is, we desperately needed to improve our cash flow position so that we can carry out this work that is so badly needed. No matter how we proceed, there is little doubt that important capital improvements will need to be made over the next ten years.

That brings me to my opening point. Despite our best efforts to cut costs, sometimes these measures are not always well received. This year, for example, kitchen staff were given Mondays and Tuesdays off, since these were by far the slowest days of the week. We have also found ourselves short on kitchen staff from time to time, so cutting the hours of operation made an abundance of sense from this perspective, as well. Added to this was the fact that weekends are always particularly busy with club events and increase demands on our restaurant services – especially when the weather is good. But staff also need days off! So, cutting hours on Mondays and Tuesdays made sense for a variety of reasons. We tried as best we could to let members know about our revised operating hours. But these measures were not always well received by members who visited the restaurant only to find it closed.

Similarly, in the past our yardmasters worked for weeks on end during launch and haul-out without taking a single day off. They did so without complaint, and accommodated the needs of members as best they could. This year, our yardmasters were given regular days off and the length of their work day was curtailed. This resulted in considerable savings in salary and overtime, as well as savings in other areas of operations. Again, we tried to provide members with the working hours of our yardmasters using whatever practical means were at our disposal. When some members came to the yacht club (obviously without any appointment or prior arrangement with the yardmasters) to have a mast lifted or to have their boats removed (or launched), they were disgusted to find that there were no yardmasters available and that their "lift" would have to wait for another day.

Most members are excellent and extremely understanding for the most part, and regardless of the circumstances, never utter a word of complaint

(even when it might be justified). For others, it's a little more difficult to accept the inconveniences that occasionally are associated with curbing costs.

My point is simply this. Reductions in operating hours are never easy to accept. Sometimes that results in inconveniences to our members – depending on your schedule or circumstances. Curbing our operating costs and carefully examining our practices and expenditures in all facets of our operations was a necessary first step to improving our financial position. It is only by doing this that we will be able to leverage the funds required to make the necessary strategic investments in wharf infrastructure that will need to be made over the next number of years.

None of us are immune to impatience, but sometimes we have to temper our expectations and pause to consider "why" changes are being made. Make a call, check the website, ask a colleague, and try to find information pertaining to various aspects of the club operations well in advance, and avoid the possibility of being disappointed when you arrive at the club.

We have a very professional and dedicated support staff at the Royal Newfoundland Yacht Club, many of whom have been with us for many years. Our yard masters and our kitchen staff are excellent and very accommodating. Our club manager, Jim Eastman, goes above and beyond the call of duty, and provides support services in many areas that would be outside the realm of responsibility for many others in similar positions. These people are there to assist you in whatever ways they can. Your Flag Officers and Executive are committed to providing you with the best possible boating experience, supports, infrastructure, and programs at the most reasonable cost possible. All we ask in return is for your continued understanding, input, patience, and support. Enjoy the remainder of the boating season, and if you have any questions about any aspect of our operations at RNYC, don't hesitate to speak to any member of the executive, drop us a line, or give us a call. Your input is always appreciated!

TIME TO START THINKING ABOUT THE 2012 LAUNCH




Yes it is true, but the upcoming haul out is a big part of it!

Moving boats in an attempt to expedite the launch process is also costly. As a consequence, the Executive Committee is currently finalizing a policy which would see an increase in the amount charged for boat relocation. This last year has seen the introduction of the RNYC Facebook page and my thanks to those that initiated it and provide ongoing input. Race week was well covered there.


Remember, if you want to see information that is not already included in the website or Spindrift, let me know. If you feel you are not being fully informed of club events and changes, again please let me know.

SAFETY AROUND THE RNYC Ted Laurentius – Executive – Safety & Training

The sailing season is almost over and even though the summer was late coming, it was good to see so many boats take advantage of the good days we had. It was also good to see the number of people wearing PFD's increasing.



Race Week came and went with no collisions and no mishaps despite a few spectacular broaches. The mandatory life jacket rule has been in effect for many years and everyone now takes it for granted and extend the practice to other activities.

This spring and early summer while we were waiting for the weather to break we had a series of CYA seminars namely Navigation, Weather, and Man Overboard. These were a tremendous success and a total of 70 people signed up which also meant a contribution of \$700 to the Junior Sailing Building fund. I would like to thank Duncan Finlayson for his efforts to present the Weather Seminar. His years of experience as a meteorologist and his thousands of miles of coastal and offshore sailing greatly helped in giving us an understanding of the weather patterns and local effects. It was very technical and perhaps too much so for some, but his extensive reading list and website references certainly provided a great resource for those that wished to gain more knowledge. As always, I will certainly repeat these or others next year if there is enough of a demand. We did not do the VHF one this year so perhaps that is one for next season.

The demand for the PCOC (Operator's Card) has been light so I assume most folks already have the card or have found other sources. The Office of Boating Safety (OBS) have tightened up the rules considerably so it is not quite so easy to obtain the certificate anymore which is a good thing. This season I only had one person challenge the exam which has been expanded to 50 questions for all versions. In fact, the OBS now provides the exams to the providers and changes them every 3 months.



SAFETY AROUND THE RNYC (Cont.)

Haulout will soon be upon us and I would like to draw your attention to new rules governing the operation of the Travel Lift. Because of an incident during launch, we now have a rule that prohibits anyone from being within 5 meters of the machine while it has a boat in the slings.

When cleaning the bottom the boat must first be lowered and partially supported on the keel before you may approach it. The same rule will apply when placing boats in cradles during final placement for the winter. We learned how a broken chain or cable can create a dangerous situation. You may be reassured that the machine has been inspected and all defective or critical parts have been replaced. You might also like to know that the Occupational Health and Safety folks from the provincial labour department have given the machine a clean bill of health. This also applies to the Mast lift Crane. I must stress here that when lifting a mast, **Do Not Stand Under It!**

In closing, while working on the boat after haulout, please take time to check the ladder you are using. I keep seeing homemade ladders that should be used for fire wood, not ladders. Safe boating.


